Soviet Statue at Fair Loaded for Home Trip

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HOBOKEN, N. J., Aug. 19—The huge statue of the worker holding the star, which dominated the Russian Pavilion at the New York World's Fair, was loaded unceremoniously today aboard the Soviet freighter Turksib, scheduled to sail from here to Russia on Wednesday or Thursday.

Working on a wharf carefully guarded, longshoremen were busy loading hundreds of crates which, a spokesman for the Amtorg Trading Company said, contained 90 per cent of the dismantled Russian exhibit. The big statue had to be divided into ten sections for crating. A small portion of the pavilion has already been sent to the U.S.S.R. The structural steel framework will be shipped soon from Bayonne, N. J.

Lighters brought the crates from Flushing to the pier at the foot of Sixth Street here about five months ago, but the war delayed shipment to Russia, it was said.

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
